The Ontario Horticultural Society (OHS) proudly launched its inaugural **OHS Great Pollinator Garden Awards (GPGA)** contest this year. Inspired by the crucial role of Ontario's native pollinators, the OHS aimed to celebrate those who created their own pollinator gardens. Participants competed for bragging rights and a distinguished plaque to showcase their winning efforts.

The awards were given to Ottawa gardeners who designed pollinator gardens focused on attracting beneficial pollinators. While native plants were critical to the design, non-native plants were also incorporated into the space. Design components required both host and nectar plants for pollinators.

GPGA CATEGORIES AND CRITERIA OVERVIEW

CATEGORIES:

Category 1: A beautiful and biodiverse **front** yard garden;

Category 2: A beautiful and biodiverse **back** yard garden;

Category 3: Boulevard and streetscape plantings on city property; and

Category 4: Use of **balcony** or **patio** garden.

CRITERIA:

- Design (balance, originality, plant arrangement);
- Condition and maintenance (free of disease, good garden practises)
- Habitat for pollinators (variety of plants, including natives).

Category 1: A beautiful and biodiverse **front yard** garden.



OVERALL, WINNER: Nina and Craig Foster McLaren

Judge's comments:

"Featured a lovely mix of structural woody species and herbaceous native plants that provide shelter and food for pollinators and birds from spring to fall. Grass paths that weave through the colourful island beds allow for pollinator observations and help the yard look well-maintained to passersby".
